

Martin Fung will be offering Chinese bamboo and boxwood carvings and a selection of lacquer. Especially worthy of note are a 17th century boxwood carving of Shoulao, the Daoist god of longevity, and a polychrome lacquer dragon-and-phoenix dish from the Wanli period of the Ming dynasty.

Himalayan art will again feature heavily at the fair. The title of **Tenzing Asian Art**'s exhibition is 'The Incomparable Sutras from Pala Art and Kashmir',

featuring illuminated sutras from the time of the Second Diffusion of Buddhism in Tibet, around the 10th to the 13th century. They will also be showing contemporaneous bronze statues, ritual implements and thangkas from the Himalayas.

Sculptures, bronzes and paintings from China, India, Mongolia, Nepal and Tibet will be on offer at Rossi & Rossi's stand. Of particular interest is a 14th century Tibetan bronze figure of Dragpa Sherab, the abbot of Densatil Monastery from 1362 to 1370. The figure wears patchwork robes incised with geometric and floral motifs, the right hand in *vitarka mudra* and the left grasping a miniature *pecha*, or book. Only one other portrait of Dragpa Sherab, a woodblock print, is known. Another highlight is an early 15th century Tibetan gilt-bronze sculpture of the bodhisattva Maitreya seated on an intricately cast lion throne.

Second-time exhibitor to the fair **Carlton Rochell** will be bringing a new collection of masterpieces of Himalayan art. Among the highlights is a *circa* 14th century thangka of Vairochana from the Drikung Kagyu school of Nepal, which comes from a European private collection. The deity is surrounded by a chorus of celestial beings, including myriad Buddhas and two standing bodhisattvas. Another highlight is a *circa* 12th/13th century gilt-bronze figure of Padmapani from Nepal. Standing in a relaxed and fluid posture, the figure is large at 79 centimetres tall.
